



2024 ANNUAL REPORT **2024** highlights show over 15,000 acres being stewarded, over 50 management plans and over 500 acres of invasive plants being put under control. Over 50 acres of forest were restored and regenerated through planting. And we continue to grow the number of acres that are storing carbon and receiving credits.

Helene slowed our work, but created new opportunities. After helping in relief efforts, our crews have been busy clearing trails to prepare for hikers and invasive plants this spring. We co-hosted a post-Helene event with the USFS Southern Research Station, where over 250 landowners and community members came to gather information and help dealing with damaged forests. We now continue the work of mitigating wildfire risk and helping landowners plan for the future.


